I. CALL TO ORDER –

The meeting was called to order at 7:06 p.m.

III. INVOCATION –

The Mayor asked all to stand for a moment of silence.

IV. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE –

V. AGENDA APPROVAL –

On a voice vote, the agenda was approved as submitted.

VI. INTRODUCTIONS –

The Mayor introduced the following individuals; Washtenaw County representatives Nathan Vogt and Deborah Borden, OHM Engineers Marcus McNamara and Kent Early, Parks and Recreation Committee members Bob Krzewinski and Anne Brown, Eastern Michigan University Professor Joe Ohren, Community Development Director Teresa Gillotti, DPS Director Stan Kirton, Assistant to the City Manager Ericka Savage, Assistant City Attorney Jesse O'Jack, City Clerk Frances McMullan, and City Attorney John Barr.

VII. PRESENTATIONS –

1. Capital Projects – City Manager Ralph Lange, DPS Director Stan Kirton, OHM Engineers Marcus McNamara and Kent Early.

Mayor Schreiber said there are two types of funding; the major streets are funded at the State and level local streets are funded by Local Governments. Mayor Schreiber added in 2000 the City passed a millage to repair local roads and that millage is still being paid.

Mayor Pro-Tem Richardson asked how long will the roads last.

Marcus McNamara, OHM Engineering, responded asphalt roads last from 15 to 20 years. Mr. McNamara stated Ypsilanti's local roads are entering their 15th year and are still in fairly good condition and part of the reason for that is the maintenance program performed by the DPS.

Mayor Pro-Tem Richardson stated on a recent trip to Marquette she noticed the roads were in much better condition there than in Ypsilanti and asked why that was.

Mr. McNamara responded it could be several reasons; the mixed designs may be different for colder climate specifications. Mr. McNamara added the biggest contributor, more than likely, is the thaw-freeze cycle where the Upper Peninsula sees two throughout the year the Lower Peninsula sees several.

City Manager Lange asked if the soil composition was more sandy in the Upper Peninsula stating in Ypsilanti there is a great deal of clay which inhibits drainage.

Mr. McNamara stated drainage could be a difference. Mr. McNamara added traffic in the Upper Peninsula is not nearly as heavy as it is here.

Council Member Vogt asked what date the PASER ratings were developed.

Mr. McNamara replied summer 2013.

Council Member Vogt stated the ratings did not include some recent repairs.

Mr. McNamara replied yes, that is correct.

City Manager Lange stated over the 2014-2015 period \$3 million have been allocated for road repairs of that only \$500,000 comes from the City.

Council Member Murdock stated grants cover \$1.9 million on the Prospect Street project; including the intersection grant and a grant for the bridge repairs plus a match from the City.

DPS Director Kirton clarified Ypsilanti is responsible for a 5% match from the City.

Council Member Murdock asked if the match will come out of the Major Street Fund.

Mr. Lange responded yes.

Council Member Murdock stated the Federal Highway Fund allocated \$75,000 for 2014, \$300,000 allocated for 2015 and \$350,000 allocated for 2016. Mr. Murdock added the City will be responsible for a \$198,000 match of which the County will pay \$144,000.

Mr. Lange stated the City may also get funding from AAATA for work done on Adams Street.

Council Member Murdock stated if the construction on Prospect and Adams will begin in 2015 and OHM is also recommending 8 other streets for repair.

Mr. McNamara responded yes, those 8 streets are candidates for repair, if funding is available. Mr. McNamara added those 8 streets would be fairly inexpensive to repair as they are not too damaged.

Council Member Murdock stated the City would be responsible for 50% of the cost for those repairs.

Mr. McNamara responded the exact amount may be lower and the City would be responsible for a 20% match to the 80% federal match for the construction. Mr. McNamara added once the cost of engineering and design are factored in the ratio is closer to 50%.

Council Member Murdock asked if the City's match would come out of the Major Street Fund.

Mr. Kirton replied yes.

Mayor Pro-Tem Richardson asked what micro-surfacing is.

Mr. McNamara responded a thin asphalt overlay, not a hot mix and has smaller granulated sand which helps seal the road and keep it in good condition.

Mayor Pro-Tem Richardson stated it is a preventative measure.

Mr. McNamara responded yes.

Council Member Robb asked if micro-surfacing was the method used on North Prospect between Thomas and Holmes.

Mr. McNamara replied no, that was spray patching, if micro-surfacing is used the road would appear new.

Mr. Lange added a good comparison would be resealing a driveway.

2. ReImagine Washtenaw Study – Community Development Director Teresa Gillotti

Council Member Robb asked Community Development Director Gillotti if there was disconnect between the ReImagine Washtenaw and the Shape Ypsi processes, stating the diagram indicates buildings not allowed in the Master Plan.

Ms. Gillotti stated the Washtenaw Corridor is commercial at Hewitt and tapers down to residential as you approach Eastern Michigan University.

Council Member Robb asked if the document given to Council on September 12th has been updated.

Ms. Gillotti replied yes it has.

Council Member Robb asked if the Planning Commission has adopted the changes.

Ms. Gillotti responded not at this date.

Mayor Schreiber stated the ReImagine Washtenaw project began with two goals; to find funding mechanisms to improve the variety of modes of transportation along the corridor and providing a continuous set of permitting guidelines from the stone coffee house in Ann Arbor to the stone water tower in Ypsilanti.

Mr. Vogt answered that is the idea put the pieces together getting the area ready for development.

Mayor Schreiber that Mr. Vogt and others involved for the hard work on this project.

VIII. AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION –

1. Joe Golder, 1002 Wasthhenaw, asked City Council to conduct an investigation into the C-MAQ Grant of 2011. Mr. Golder informed Council that due to the work done by that grant EMU was able to encroach on his property which has affected his quality of life.
2. Deborah Borden, Service Coordinator for Washtenaw County Tobacco-Use Prevention Program, stated she is in support of the Ordinance to ban smoking in "tot lots". Ms. Borden stated the cigarette butts pollute the area and pose a health risk to children.

3. Monique James, Washtenaw Community College, stated she is glad that a resolution considering a memorandum of understanding is going before Council and is grateful that the partnership is going to continue.
4. Tom Frye, 1355 Lathers, stated he is here on behalf of the Parkridge Center and is very pleased with its continued improvement. Mr. Frye asked Council to take a moment of their time and visit the Parkridge Center and see all the improvements that have been made.

IX. REMARKS BY THE MAYOR –

- Mayor Schreiber thanked all those who spoke; Ms. Borden for supporting the smoking ban in the “tot lots” and Mr. Frye and Ms. James for their support of the Parkridge agreement.
- Mayor Schreiber asked City Attorney John Barr to provide Council with a summary of the matter presented by Mr. Golder.

City Attorney John Barr stated during Eastern Michigan University construction of Oakwood the land was surveyed and EMU and the City, provided with evidence documented by the County, saw no issue and construction commenced. Mr. Barr stated Mr. Golder believed there is a vacated alley however there is no evidence of this with the Register of Deeds. Mr. Barr stated that if Mr. Golder has any new evidence he would review that and make a decision, if there is no new evidence the decision will remain the same.

Mayor Pro-Tem Richardson asked what would make Mr. Golder satisfied with this situation and that Council should ask him how to settle this matter.

Mayor Schreiber responded he would provide Mayor Pro-Tem Richardson with Mr. Golder’s phone number however, Mayor Schreiber stated, he has never been able to resolve that issue.

City Manager Lange stated he has spoken with Mr. Golder and a monetary number was discussed, however, after speaking with EMU and the attorney’s office it was found that a settlement would not be appropriate.

A. Resolution No. 2014-234, determination

RESOLUTION TO ADOPT ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT SMOKING IN TOT LOTS

IT IS RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF YPSILANTI that: the ordinance entitled "An ordinance to amend the Ypsilanti City Code to prohibit smoking in the City's tot-lot playgrounds" be adopted on first reading.

Bob Krzewinski, Parks and Recreation Committee, stated the original plan was to ban smoking in all City parks, however, it was felt that at this time it would not be possible. Mr. Krzewinski stated there is support to ban smoking in "tot lots" (Parks including children's playground equipment). Mr. Krzewinski stated it is not expected that police monitor parks and issue tickets but to protect those most vulnerable from second hand smoke as well as littler from cigarette butts. Mr. Krzewinski added this ordinance will also send an image that Ypsilanti is a healthy community

1. Resolution No. 2014-237, approving the Washtenaw Avenue Corridor Transportation Study.

RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF YPSILANTI:

WHEREAS, ReImagine Washtenaw is a cooperative, multi-jurisdictional planning, place-making, transportation, and economic development effort, led by Washtenaw County and stakeholders including the Cities of Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti and Pittsfield Charter Townships, the Michigan Department of Transportation, and the Ann Arbor Area Transportation Authority, among others.

WHEREAS, Washtenaw County secured a \$3,000,000 Community Challenge Planning Grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), which funded, in part, a comprehensive transportation study of Washtenaw Avenue, known as the Corridor Improvement Study completed in April 2014; and

WHEREAS, the Corridor Improvement Study was the result of an 18-month process, involving significant public input, to provide a detailed plan for the future of the corridor that incorporates specific land use, transportation, non-motorized, and public transit goals; and

WHEREAS, the success of the Corridor Improvement Study depends on all stakeholders diligently and consistently implementing its provisions, including future public access limits necessary to improve the roadway in the future to provide for adequate vehicular travel lanes, bicycle lanes, and pedestrian sidewalks; and

WHEREAS, all four local units of government have adopted, or will adopt, master plan and zoning regulations to ensure that future private land use patterns provide for walkable, vibrant, mixed-use districts that emphasize sense of place and high quality development, and integration with public transit; and

WHEREAS, the Corridor Improvement Study is equally important to establish a clear, consistent public improvement plan for the public right-of-way, in order that a truly vibrant, high value, transit-oriented corridor can be achieved.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Ypsilanti hereby supports and adopts the Corridor Improvement Study, with the understanding that future more detailed analysis will be required and coordination with MDOT in order to implement all of its provisions.

2. Resolution No. 2014-238, approving the appointment of Erika Lindsay to Boards and Commissions.

3. Resolution No 2014-239, approving the PA 198 Industrial Facilities Tax Abatement for rear property improvements at 575 S. Mansfield (American Broach).

RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF YPSILANTI:

WHEREAS, Ypsilanti City Council approved a PA 198 Industrial Facilities Tax Abatement for rear property improvements at 575 S. Mansfield in 2011; and

WHEREAS, the owners of the American Broach/QC American decided against building and additional building, preferring to buy an existing building at a nearby location;

Community Development Coordinator Gillotti stated it was a revocation of the property.

XIII. RESOLUTIONS/MOTIONS/DISCUSSIONS –

1. Resolution No. 2014-240, supporting mid-block crossing improvements and Hawk crossing on Washtenaw in front of Eastern Michigan University.

RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF YPSILANTI:

WHEREAS, the Michigan Department of Transportation has studied the existing pedestrian crossing on Washtenaw by the Dominos and Eastern Michigan University and determined that the crossing warrants a HAWK – High-Intensity Activated crossWalk beacon; and

WHEREAS, Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) Grant would be eligible for related improvements including demolition and reconstruction of the median, addition of ADA ramps,

enhanced mast arms for the HAWK signal and related electrical connections; and;

WHEREAS, the City of Ypsilanti seeks to create a clear, designated safe pedestrian crossing in this high-traffic area by Eastern Michigan University; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Ypsilanti City Council hereby request the MDOT University District office apply for an MDOT Transportation Alternative Program grant to fund the Hawk and related pedestrian safety improvements on behalf and in cooperation with the City of Ypsilanti and Eastern Michigan University.

Community Development Coordinator Gillotti stated on Cross St. near EMU before Washtenaw Ave, people either use the light at summit to cross or cross without a signal. Ms. Gillotti informed Council part of the ReImagine Washtenaw Project is creating greater safety along that corridor. Ms. Gillotti stated with the help of MDOT an area was chosen to install a HAWK crosswalk. Ms. Gillotti said the crosswalk would be by the bus stop on Cross near Eastern. Ms. Gillotti stated MDOT will be the applicant for the grant as well as pay for the HAWK signal. Ms. Gillotti added MDOT is only asking for a 20% contribution from its partners, EMU has already promised \$15,000 and the RIDE has been asked for another \$15,000, leaving the City with a possibility of a \$10,000 match. Ms. Gillotti explained this Resolution does not promise a contribution it simply is support for MDOT to follow through with the grant application.

Council Member Murdock asked what is the year of the grant.

Ms. Gillotti responded 2015.

Council Member Murdock stated this is an important and doable project which ties into the ReImagine Washtenaw initiative.

Mayor Pro-Tem Richardson asked if this is where Cross meets Packard.

Ms. Gillotti replied yes.

Mayor Schreiber asked if the HAWK signal would have a red light.

Ms. Gillotti responded yes, the light would blink yellow than become solid red eventually turning back to yellow.

2. Resolution No. 2014-241, approving the Memorandum of Understanding between Washtenaw Community College and the City of Ypsilanti regarding Parkridge Center.

RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF YPSILANTI:

WHEREAS, funding for Parks and Recreation in the City is limited at this time;

WHEREAS, the City of Ypsilanti recognizes the importance of the maintenance of its Parks and Recreation resources to the quality of life of citizens;

WHEREAS, partnerships with organizations having an interest in those resources are necessary to accomplish goals for improving and maintaining the quality of life in the City;

WHEREAS, the Washtenaw Community College has assumed operational and management responsibilities for the Parkridge Community Center;

WHEREAS, the City wishes to continue a contractual relationship with Washtenaw Community College to provide training, education and recreational programming at the Parkridge Community Center; and

NOW THEREFORE IT IS RESOLVED THAT the Mayor and the City Clerk are authorized to sign the attached Memorandum of Understanding allowing the Washtenaw Community College to continue to operate the Parkridge Center on behalf of the City of Ypsilanti for two years, beginning on January 1, 2015.

City Manager Lange stated there were some legal initially which have been resolved. Mr. Lange added that Assistant City Attorney Dan DuChene and Anthony Williamson were a tremendous help.

Mayor Pro-Tem Richardson said she would like to echo the sentiments of Mr. Frye regarding the Parkridge Center, it wasn't an easy job keeping it open but the City was able to. Ms. Richardson also thanked Mr. Williamson for his dedicated work as director of the Center. Ms. Richardson added she regretted that the WCC Harriet Center has suffered, although Saturday, October 18th the Center had two programs running from open till close. Ms. Richardson concluded by congratulating Mr. Williamson and thanking Washtenaw Community College for renewing the Memorandum of Understanding.

Council Member Jefferson expressed his gratitude to Mr. Frye who has made certain the Parkridge Center had been looked after in both his time and finances. Mr. Jefferson stated Mr. Williamson does an excellent job, not only with the administration of the center's programs and staff, but his effect on the children who attend the center's summer camp. Mr. Jefferson concluded by saying that many of the children that attended the summer camp are seeking higher education.

Mayor Schreiber thanked Mr. Williamson and stated he met Mr. Williamson during the 1990's while on the Ypsilanti Housing Commission. Mayor Schreiber added he appreciated all the work Mr. Williamson has done for the City at many different positions and the incredible effect that he has had on community youth.

XV. COUNCIL PROPOSED BUSINESS –

Richardson

- Stated she has been approached by many citizens who have expressed concern regarding the Hamilton Road Diet. Ms. Richardson stated if the lane number is reduced traffic will be horrendous down that stretch.
- Stated that a painted crosswalk at the Hamilton Crossing building would make it safer.
- Thanked Community Development Coordinator Teresa Gillotti for her years of service to the City and wished her well in her future endeavors.

Murdock

- Stated another “stop for pedestrian” sign has been stolen leaving only two remaining.
- Asked if the roads, especially those recently paved, could be striped at the intersection as the turn lanes have become difficult to identify.
- Thanked Ms. Gillotti for her service and also thanked the Mayor and Council Member Jefferson for their dedicated service to the City.

Robb

- Thanked City Manager Lange for assisting in solving the Stanley Rd problem.
- Asked what is being done with 16 N. Washington.

Community Development Coordinator Gillotti responded the owner has been ticket and is on the dangerous building list.

Council Member Robb stated the building is being used as storage which is not allowed in a B3 zone and the City needs to follow through with this matter.

- Stated the material used for the spray patching of Prospect Rd. is now on the property of the citizens along that stretch of Road and it needs to be rectified before the start of winter.
- Thanked Ms. Gillotti for her service and hopes she will remain a presence in the community.

- Thanked Council Member Jefferson and Mayor Schreiber for their dedicated service.
- Stated he saw the pedestrian sign Mr. Murdock was referring to laying down and feels that it wasn't stolen and that it is probably somewhere in the area.

Vogt

- Stated that as a County employee he would like to welcome Ms. Gillotti and expressed his gratitude for her work with the City. Mr. Vogt thanked both Mayor Schreiber and Council Member Jefferson for their years of service. Mr. Vogt also thanked Mr. Jefferson for his work with troubled youth and the Mayor for his 20 years of service to the City.

Jefferson

- Thanked the Mayor for his 19 years with the City. Mr. Jefferson added initially when he was on Council the Mayor helped him to understand how to stay committed as a Council Member.
- Thanked Ms. Gillotti for all that she has done for Ypsilanti.
- Asked for an update on 117 N. Washington as it continues to be an issue.
- Stated there needs to be a discussion regarding lighting at Hamilton and Harriet as well as a discussion about converting Hamilton to a two way road.

XVI. COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR –

- Asked City Attorney Barr how the organizational meeting should be formatted.

City Attorney Barr stated there is no exact protocol on how to change Council, the Charter stats Council makes up its own rules. Mr. Barr said historically Council meet swear in the next Council and hand the organizational documents to the new Council who will decide the rules for the next term. Mr. Barr added that he and City Clerk McMullan have discussed how to fill the vacant Council seat and in the Charter there is nothing specific however in the past there was a nomination a second and a vote to fill the vacancy.

- Asked to nominate Kenneth Dobsen II for the Downtown Development Authority. Mayor Schreiber stated Mr. Dobsen is the Government Community Relations Director at EMU and was suggested by EMU President Susan Martin. Mayor Schreiber added he has discussed this nomination with the incoming Mayor who agreed. Mayor Schreiber asked if Council had any objection to the nomination.

Council Member Murdock responded he would prefer that the new Mayor make the appointment.

- Thanked Ms. Gillotti and stated she has always been helpful and knowledgeable.
- Thanked Council and said that it has been a pleasure working with them as well as the City Manager and Staff. Mayor Schreiber stated he will still be around and asked if Council wishes he would again sit on the Ypsilanti Housing Commission.

City Manager Lange asked if the Mayor was going to discuss the transition meeting.

- Mayor Schreiber asked City Attorney John Barr to discuss the transition meeting.

City Attorney Barr stated the new Council takes office at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, November 10, if the meeting begins at 7:00 p.m. the present Council would begin the meeting.

Council Member Murdock stated the organization meeting in the past was always presided over by the New Council.

Council Member Robb stated when Mr. Bodary left, Council conducted business before Ms. Moeller was sworn in to Council.

Council Member Jefferson stated when he was sworn in the old Council was present to conduct business before the new members took their seat.

Mayor Schreiber stated that was also the case in 2006 and it is the prerogative of Council how they wish to proceed. Mayor Schreiber asked Council if they had any objections to just having the new Council sworn in on November 10th and not have the old Council present.

Mayor Pro-Tem Richardson asked if there was going to be a Council meeting on the 6th, if not will business be conducted at the meeting held on the November 10th.

Council Member Murdock responded the meeting held on November 10th is primarily focused on organizational material.

Mayor Pro-Tem Richardson asked if that means the first Council meeting in November will be bypassed.

Council Member Murdock stated Council will still hold a meeting on November 18th.
